Windsurfer One-Design Racing in the Finger Lakes

(and western New York)



A Digital Scrapbook

The Windsurfer was marketed by Windsurfing International of California beginning in 1969. A one design racing class was established soon after as a way to help promote the sport. One design means that everyone uses the same board and rig when they race. I'm maybe not the best person to relate the history of Windsurfer one design racing in the Finger Lakes. I have, though, kept the documentation I acquired from the time I first became aware of and then involved with the scene (1976). What follows is a chronological presentation of these documents.

A local fleet in the Rochester area was started in 1973-74. There were scenes forming with some excellent sailors at Cayuga Lake as well as Cuba Lake in southwestern New York around 1974-76. Windsurfing was also catching on in the western Finger Lakes region (Conesus Lake) in 1976-77.

Through the later 1970's, fleets began to grow as windsurfing rapidly spread around the US and the world. Soon there were multiple races scheduled locally and regionally each year. In the Finger Lakes, the growing number of sailors ultimately coalesced into Windsurfer Fleet 62. This was largely due to the efforts of George Bagley and Tom and Diane Wallon of Conesus Lake who organized regattas and coordinated with sailors on other lakes to put together a full schedule of races throughout the summer.

By 1980, more than 500,000 Windsurfers had been sold worldwide. Heavily attended championship regattas for North America, Europe, Japan, and Australia as well as a World Championship Regatta were held each year.

In retrospect, the Finger Lakes Windsurfer one design racing scene did not last that long. For all intents and purposes, it was over by 1985. Worldwide one design racing also began to decline. The sport of windsurfing, both from an equipment and a business perspective was changing rapidly. If I remember correctly, the peak year for racing in the Finger Lakes was probably 1983 when as many as 60-70 sailors from all over the area competed in the Finger Lakes Championship Regatta on Conesus Lake.

It was a lot of fun being involved in such an exciting and cool sport early on and watching it explode into a world-wide phenomenon. For those of you who were there, I hope these pages bring back good memories of a sport and a time that have had such a lifelong positive impact on me.

Their promotion a breeze

The sports world has grown to be one of the more complex mechanisms known to man. Its growing popularity through the years has been helped along by eager individuals, not basically trying to make just a fast buck, but trying to make an honest one in a sport they feel is worthwhile.

Two such people are Skip and Karen Harrison, a young California couple in town to promote a relatively new sport called windsurfing.

Their immediate purpose of this week's Rochester visit is to spread the word about the upcoming America's Teacup Regatta, sort of the World Series or Super Bowl of windsurfing.

But their main objective is to stir up some excitement about the sport. And to do that, they both are well rehearsed and briefed, in addition to knowing what they are trying to sell.

Harrison, who has the title of marketing director for a Los Angeles-based company called Windsurfing International, journeyed more than 50,000 miles with his wife the past year. His job is to spread the word, while his athletic-looking spouse chimes in from time to time with perfectly timed comments.

Another big plus in their favor is their looks. They're trim and blonde and they fit the role they've been cast to.

But in the same respect, their promotion is legitimate. It has the backing of

the Tea Council of the United States and is partly under supervision by Yacht Racing Magazine. It is not a hoax.

Simply, windsurfing is the marriage of a surfboard and a sail. The idea behind the sport is a waveless ride while the participant stands on the board and steers by the sail. The entire windsurfing rig sells for around \$415.

Windsurfing International is the leading manufacturer of the crafts.

The key to the Harrisons' trip here this time is to promote the regional finals July 20 on Canandaigua Lake. The winner, and most likely the runner-up, win an all-expenses-paid trip to the national championship near Watertown at Association Island from Aug. 10-12. From there, the first world championships will be held at Association Island through

"We'd like to see windsurfing become a household word," says Karen. "Plus, we've had the energy crisis on our side. It's helped the sport's popularity."

"There's a club in San Francisco which holds somewhere aroung 38 events a year," adds Skip, "But what most people don't realize is that there are more windsurfers in the East than out where we come from.

"California has the bulk of them, but that's just the one state. The East is the largest windsurfing place right now. The national championship was held in San Diego the past two years, but because of the popularity out here, we thought it was necessary to hold it in the East this year."

When asked about the success or failure of the sport, Skip is quick to reply.

"We've done this for a while now," he says, "and I don't think it's been fruitless. I wouldn't say it's going downhill. I'm pleased with the results. I just want to see it get bigger."

Their organization has a bulletin called the Windsurfing News. The Harrison' have a Madison Avenue firm plotting their course, 10-minute movie about the sport to show while they're talking and all sorts of advertising material.

The Harrisons are instructors and experts in the sport. And they have found a living in something that doesn't seem like a job to them. It trully is a job, but one they enjoy.

The proficiency of their delivery is surpassed by no one. They have apparently rehearsed and rehearsed, over and over again. Even if they didn't believe in what they were selling (which they do) you'd believe them.

The Harrisons are hard workers. Their product and their sport has been ingeniously conceived and promoted. They come at you with a down-to-earth, easy-going style lacking from sports that have grown too big to handle.

And the more they intend to keep on plugging it, the greater it will grow. They've taken it this far, and the only way to continue is up.



WINDSURFING—What do you get when you marry a sail to a surfboard? A lot of fun, answers Pete Smyth

ne day not too long ago, a Windsurfer dealer called in an order. It was lunch time and the call was taken by one of the young men who, switched on by Windsurfing, had decided to make his living building Windsurfers. The order was substantial and the young man, when he relayed it to the order department after the lunch break, said, "Gee, that guy must really dig Windsurfing. Look at all the boats he's sold."

"Nope," replied the order department, "he doesn't sail at all. All he does is sell boats."

"What!" exclaimed our young production worker, "You mean he's just doing it for the money?" This vignette of life at Windsurfer International offers in-

This vignette of life at Windsurfer International offers insight into the attitudes that seem to motivate much of the company's personnel. For example, to Skip and Karen Harrison, Windsurfer's Eastern representatives and my main contact with the company, Windsurfing is considerably more than just a job, a refreshing attitude indeed in this day of businessmen instead of boatmen building boats.

And the Windsurfer is a boat. It is not merely a surfboard to which a sail has been fitted. It would be very easy to classify it as a beach toy, at least it would be easy to so classify it until you got aboard one and started sailing one, or—more correctly—trying to sail one.

Windsurfing is rather total involvement. It has all the mental requirements of normal sailing, plus the physical needs of surfing.

While the demand for physical strength isn't overly large—I would suppose anyone in reasonably good shape would have no trouble handling a Windsurfer—the demands of coordination and physical fitness are large, hence is the source of much of its appeal. Things that are too easy to do tend to grow flat and dull quickly. This will never happen to Windsurfing; it is such that perfection is a goal to be sought not attained.

All of which makes Windsurfing sound very difficult. It isn't. The rudiments are easy enough to grasp if you have reasonable coordination, a reasonable sense of balance and no aversion to fairly frequent and unscheduled dunkings.

Sailing a Windsurfer rests heavily on the relationship between the center of effort of the sail, and the center of lateral resistance of the tiny daggerboard. Raking the mast and sail forward makes the boat head off; raking it aft causes the boat to head up. There is no rudder, so directional control is maintained by raking the rig forward or aft to suit. Tacking is achieved by letting the rig go all the way aft, rounding up, stepping lightly around the mast and then pulling the rig forward quickly to make the boat bear away on the opposite tack. Tacking is one of the more difficult tricks to accomplish. The first time I tried it, although I didn't go overboard, I spent quite a while in irons trying to figure out how to get around the mast without taking a dive.

There are other difficult moments, but the old nemesis of sailboats—jibing—is surprisingly easy. Since the rig is in a universal joint, the whole can be let go forward and then

retrimmed on the new jibe. It's a lot easier than tacking. That's a switch.

Getting started with a Windsurfer is pretty easy too. Getting underway starts with the boat rigged and ready, with the mast and sail laying in the water. Presumably, you're aimed in the direction you wish to go and the wind is on the beam, more or less. Merely climb aboard, stand up facing to leeward and start lifting the rig by means of the line attached to the mast at the wishbone boom. The sail will weather vane and luff while you're doing this. When it is up, grab the wishbone near the mast with your forward hand, a hand that can now be called the shroud hand since it is the sole support of the rig.

To get going, merely grasp the wishbone as far aft as you can with your other hand (the sheet hand) and trim in, remembering that the heeling effect of the trimmed sail can only be counteracted by your body weight to windward.


As the wind velocity increases, you will have to hike out farther and farther. As a result, since your arms are only so long, the rig will go out to windward, too. The epitome of this body and sail to windward comes when the sailor is hiked out flat to windward and he can—and a Windsurfer often will for the hell of it—dunk his head backwards in the water. As I said, Windsurfing is another whole thing.

And, having been introduced in 1969, it is a sport that is relatively new, too, although with 7,000 boats worldwide, it is already larger than most one-design classes. The boat was the mutual brainchild of Fred Payne, Jim Drake and Hoyle Schweitzer. Hoyle, an ex-computer engineer is the president of Windsurfer and is the only one of the three developers still involved. There are currently 3,000 boats in the United States with large fleets also in South Africa, Germany, Holland, Denmark and Japan.

In the United States, Windsurfer racing is organized by the Windsurfing Association. (Dr. Allan Parducci, 317 Beirut Avenue, Pacific Palisades, California.) Currently, there are 16 organized fleets, 10 more in the works, and a large number of disorganized fleets. Racing is available all over the country and the association's newsletter carries the dates of all the regattas. This year's world championship will be held at Lake Ontario's Association Island between August 10-15. Since the boat, all ready to go, costs only *** Windsurfing** 449.5** has to be amongst the least expensive racing around.

But racing is only part of the pleasure that can be derived from the 65-pound, polyethylene-covered, polyure-thane foam-cored Windsurfer. It has been said that small boats offer more sheer sailing pleasure than large ones. This is true not only because the hassle level is low when the boat is little, but because you're nearer, both physically and emotionally, to what you and the boat are, and the sea and the wind are up to. Windsurfing, by making you an integral, functioning part of the boat, offers a maximum in sailing involvement. And that's not bad. §

A BRIEF HISTORY OF WINDSURFING

September 1, 1976

The Windsurfer was developed in 1967 by computer analyst Hoyle Schweitzer and aeronautical engineer James Drake, both southern Californians. Along with the birth of this then-unique free sail system, an entire new sporting concept was conceived. 36 year old Schweitzer began building a few boats for his friends from his Pacific Palisades garage in 1969 and shortly thereafter decided to leave his position as vice president of a computer service firm to devote full time to the promotion of this new sport. He and his wife, Diane, set up an office in their home from which they proceeded to attack a hitherto non-existant market. By 1972 they had moved operations to a factory in Santa Monica and in 1974 they moved once again to a quadruple-the-space plant & offices in the Marina Del Rey where they currently supervise operations of the international business. Bu 1971 European sales were growing to such vast proportions that they began searching for a licensee who could handle the hungry market. In 1973 a licensing contract with a large multinational Dutch firm, Nijverdal Ten Cate, was executed and 'Ten Cate Windsurfing' was born. Growth rate for Ten Cate Windsurfing has been astronomical; in 1976 they produced 15,000 Windsurfers. Due to the great popularity of the sport in Europe combined with the short supply of Windsurfers, several other free sail systems have entered that market and will probably account for an additional 10-15,000 units during the year. Most of these are either direct copies or lesser quality models.

In 1974 a second licensee was appointed to manufacture Windsurfers, this time in Tokyo, and 'Windsurfing Japan' was on its way. In August of 1976 a 3rd licensee was established—this time in the fertile Australian market; Windsurfing Australia is headquartered in Sydney.

Just over 5,000 Windsurfers had been delivered in the United States as of June 1976. Anticipated sales for 1977 are in excess of 2,500—the domestic market is growing but is still a market aimed directly at the enthusiast and not at the general consumer—a thrust which is likely to be several years away. There are currently 150 dealers and 50 'Certified Windsurfing Sailing Schools' in North America.

Windsurfing International, Inc. is currently casting serious glances farther abroad for potential licensees in the promising markets of Canada, Central & South America, & New Zealand which must now import their Windsurfers.

An owners Association, the International Windsurfing Association, has been formed to help promote the competitive aspects of the one design class Windsurfer which is raced as a yacht under IYRU Rules. Entrants in the most recent 1975 Windsurfer World Championships held in Bendor, France totaled 212, the largest one design regatta ever held in Europe. 1976 Windsurfer World Championships will be held in Nassau, Bahamas with attendance estimated at 1,000 and actual entrants estimated at 300 - 400.

With such a strictly one-design class boat, there have been rumblings from well respected yachtsmen throughout the world regarding the possibility of establishing windsurfing as an Olympic event--the true test of skill being the competitive factor rather than the equipment differences.

Viewed from all aspects the future for the Windsurfer is rosy. The sport is here to stay and is going to experience rapid growth in these next few years which will firmly ensconce windsurfing as one of the great international sports.

a part of the wind. But in the beginning he may more often be a part of the water, so some swimming ability is essential. The board is directed by tilting the sail into or out of the wind, not by leaning, and the experts say to keep your back straight, hold on, and move your feet. The board feels similar to a waterbed under your feet and is more easily moved than the sail. Because of its construction, you need very little wind in order to board sail. And, though you don't need waves, they add another dimension to the sport. In high wind and large waves, a board sailor can actually become airborne, flying over waves and landing softly, with the sail acting as a parachute. This is what you see in the Sunkist television ads and is only for more experienced board sailors. Because body movements are similar, snow and water skilers seem to pick up windsurfing

Why windsurf? On the practical side, windsurfing is convenient because you can do it almost anywhere there is water

and it is less expensive, safer, and better exercise than sailing. From the aesthetic point of view, it can be both peaceful and exhilirating, can be done alone or with others, is natural, involving your whole body, and always remains chailenging no matter how skilled you become. In Europe, where

more than 500,000 boards have been sold in the past few years, windsurfing is fast surpassing snow skiing in popularity. Windsurfing is the only sailing sport that offers competition in freestyle and slalom, and is slated as a new Olympic event for 1984. The local scene. If you already own a board, you probably know what a great area this is for windsurfing. Favorite locations include Irondequoit Bay, Canandaigua and Conesus Lake, and Mendon Ponds. If you're ready to give it a try, you can learn, rent, and buy from these folks: Sherry Widmer, at Canandaigua, 1-554-3779; Windriders at Conesus, 1-346-5201; Sailing Center of Western New York at Irondequoit Bay,

342-9580; Shumway Marine, on

Lake Ontario, 342-3030. While the

cost for a board may seem high, starting between \$800-\$900, this is considerably less than other boats and costs very little after the initial investment. Rental costs vary, requiring some proof of proficiency, usually a certificate from Windsurfing International, Inc. Lessons range from approx. \$7-\$15 per hour and most agree that you need between four to eight hours to get the fundamentals of board sailing. Though the Rundel Library carries several very good books on the sport, even they say you learn faster and better in a class than on your own. All four of the local dealers provide free lessons with purchase of a board, and most offer special group rates.

Coming Events: While Windsurfers in the area are still trying to find one another. a few fleets have been organized and special events planned. On July 11, Fleet etc. will hold their July Regatta at the northeast section of Conesus Lake (call Windriders to register). On July 18, the Widmer Regatta will be held at the far souther and of Canandalgua Lake. There will be standard 3-mile, 3-point races and the overall winner will receive a new sail from Widmer Winery (call 1-554-3779 to register), Spectators are more than welcome at both events. Whether you're an indefatigable adventurer like Frenchman Arnaud de Rosnay, who windsurfed from Alaska to Siberia three months after crossing the Sahara Desert on a specially-equipped sailboard, or a pantheistic prophet like Reverend Rick of the First Church of Boardsailing, Universal Life Church No. 24266, "the fellowship of the radiant wind in the azure sky," if you enjoy the wind and the water, windsurfing may be just what you need to make this an unforgettable sum-

Summer has finally arrived! Yes, it's time to pull the old board out of storage and get down to some serious business...having fun! We've put together a great schedule of events with just the right ingredients to make this summer the best ever for IWCA competition. From the District 7 Championships in June to the Fall Foliage Regette in September, you'll find we've packed this year's schedule with plenty of good times, good friends, good parties, and of course, good sailing! But there's no time to lose...the District 7 Championships are less than 4 weeks away!

WHAT IS CLASS LEGAL?

With the recent changes in the Windsurfer One Design sailboard, several District 7 members have called to ask what exactly is class legal. Because of this, the IWCA recently conducted a random survey among District Chairman and Fleet Captains regarding their views and opinions on the grandfathering of old equipment. All of those surveyed recommended that some form of grandfathering be implemented , while over 60% were in favor of indefinite grandfathering with a one year notice of cancellation. Since this was by far the most popular alternative, the IWCA has therefore decided to adopt it as policy. This means that grandfathering at the District Championship level and below will be in effect until the sailors and IWCA officers feel that the majority of active sailors in Region America are competing on new equipment. At that time, a one year notice of cancellation will be sent out to all IWCA members. Once the one year period has expired, grandfathered equipment will no longer be class legal.

Several people surveyed indicated that this action would allow for a natural attrition of grandfethered equipment as current IWCA members traded in old-style boards and rigs for new. Others commented that this may take a long time (Windsurfer sailboards tend to have a long lifetime), but is necessary to ensure that current owners of grandfethered equipment will be able to participate in IWCA activities.

Citing the fact that many members are now sailing with the new rig, the IWCA has recommended that all sallors roce together at both Fleet and District level events. This policy will ensure that no members are alienated from the rest of the fleet because of their choice of equipment. It will also make regular management easier and allow for more racing time. Competition at higher level events (National and World Championships) will be conducted on only the Windsurfer One Design sailboard. The IWCA has made arrangements to supply rental boards at these events for a minimal charge.

Under the current grandfethering clause, any equipment that was class legal in the past, and is considered class legal now, will be legal for IWCA racing. These items include:

Hulls: Classic, Comp, and Freestyle hulls are class legal as well as the One Design hull with its adjustable mest track. (Both the Windsurfer Regatta Deggerboard and the Windsurfer One Design Centerboard are also class legal.)

Sails: The 8.5 Decron, 8.5 DuraLam, and 7.5 One Design sails are class legal. (The 6.5 Decron Sail is legal for freestyle and slalom competition.)

Masts: The 14' 8" One Design Mast (red), 14' 2" Windsurfer TT Mast (glossy blue), and the 13' 8" Windsurfer Mast (dull blue) with a 6" mast tip are all class legal.

Booms: The 8.5' Windsurfer Boom or the 5.5' Ultimete Systems Boom with a 24" extension is class lead.

Skegs: The 9" black skeg and the 8" red skeg are both class legal.



He and other hearty sailors were greeted with 20 to 30 knot winds and four to six foot waves. Enthusiasts claim that's the best possible kind of weather for good sailboarding.

Britton is owner of Quantum Leap Sailboards. He took a half day off from his store in Pittsford to get the full benefit of the weather.

Fleet 62 was inactive in 1985. District 7 was slowing down. For a variety of reasons, In retrospect, the Finger Lakes Windsurfer racing scene did not last that long. For all intents and purposes, it was over by 1985. Worldwide one design racing also began to quickly decline. The sport of windsurfing, both from an equipment and a business perspective was changing rapidly. Multiple vendors began offering shorter and lighter boards for wave riding and jumping. Sail designs were evolving. Many sailors were buying shorter, faster, and more maneuverable boards and focusing on looking for big wind and waves.
